

Overview of Hazard Incidents in September 2017

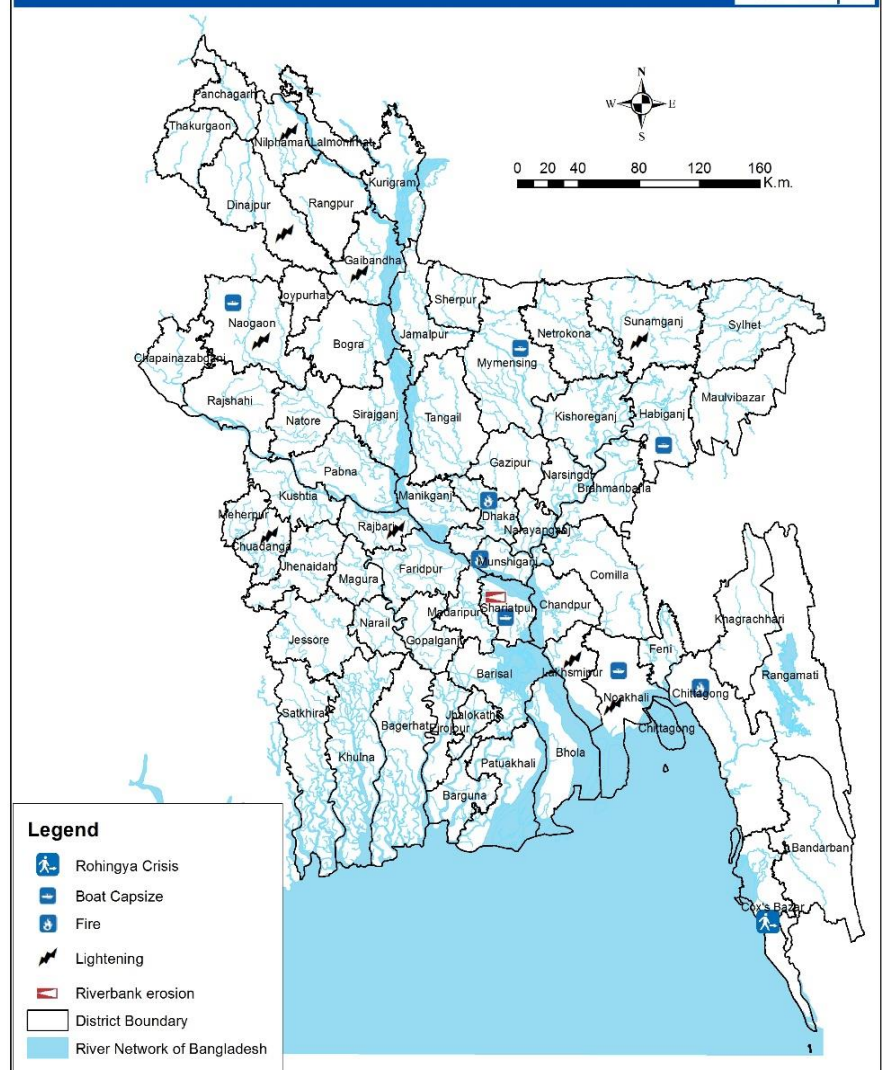
In September, 4 incidents occurred among which 2 were natural (riverbank erosion and lightning) and 2 were manmade (fire and boat/trawler capsizes). Incidents in September are low at number and almost all of these are localized in scale. Despite of being low in frequency, these incidents took 43 lives in 17 districts.

Of the 43 death, lightning took total 20 people's lives in 09 affected districts, boat/ trawler capsizes took total 16 people's lives and fire incidents took 7 people's lives in affected 03 districts. Almost 3,885 household, 4 Government primary school and 99 shops of the 3 upazilas of Shariatpur districts were wiped out due to riverbank erosion in this month.

Recently, another most concerned humanitarian issue is the Rohingya crisis. UNHCR has declared a "Level 3 Emergency" for this refugee crisis (Supplementary Appeal – Myanmar Refugee Emergency Response In Bangladesh, UNHCR). According to "Bangladesh: Humanitarian Response Plan - September 2017 / February 2018 - Rohingya Refugee Crisis, Office of the UN Resident Coordinator, Bangladesh", as of 1 October 2017, more than 809,000 Rohingyas are estimated to be sheltering in Bangladesh, having fled violence and persecution in Myanmar.

Description of the Incidents in September 2017



Riverbank Erosion

Almost 3,885 households, 4 Government primary schools and 99 shops of the 3 upazilas (Janjira, Naria, Bhedarganj) at Shariatpur have been wiped out in the Padma river from September 01 - 16 due to riverbank erosion. The impact scenario of riverbank erosion is given in the below table:

Boat/Trawler Capsize

6 incidents of boat/trawler capsized occurred in September 03th, 07th, 11th, and 18th in respectively Mymensingh, Naogaon, Habiganj, Shariatpur and Noakhali districts. About 16 people died, 2 injured and 16 people had been missing on these incidents. The details of the impact of boat capsized is given in the table below:

Lightning

There were 12 lightning incidents in September, 2017. As for geographic spread, 09 districts namely Rajbari, Laxmipur, Noakhali, Sunamganj, Nilphamari, Dinajpur, Gaibandha, Naogaon and Chuadanga had experienced lightning. These incidents caused death of 20 people and 10 people were injured. The impact scenario of lightning is given in the table below:

Fire

There were 07 fire incidents in September, 2017. As for geographic spread, 03 districts (Dhaka, Chittagong and Munshiganj) experienced fire. Among the 07 incidents, 05 occurred in Dhaka. These incidents caused 07 people died and 11 people were burned. The overall impact scenario of fire is given in the table below:

Rohingya Crisis

Recently, another most concerned humanitarian issue is the Rohingya crisis. UNHCR has declared a “Level 3 Emergency” for this refugee crisis (Supplementary Appeal – Myanmar Refugee Emergency Response In Bangladesh, UNHCR). According to “Bangladesh: Humanitarian Response Plan - September 2017 / February 2018 - Rohingya Refugee Crisis, Office of the UN Resident Coordinator, Bangladesh”, as of 1 October 2017, more than 809,000 Rohingyas are estimated to be sheltering in Bangladesh, having fled violence and persecution in Myanmar. The Government and agency actors, including UNHCR, are rapidly mounting a response. Basic needs, including food and health care are being provided. Further to tarpaulins already being provided to the refugees, the Government has designated 2,000 acres of land near the existing Kutupalong site and called on UNHCR, IOM, WFP and other agencies to build 14,000 shelters and establish other services there as a matter of urgency. Government

security personnel are being deployed to ensure law and order (Supplementary Appeal – Myanmar Refugee Emergency Response In Bangladesh, UNHCR).

Responses in September 2017

GoB Response in Fire

The Government of Bangladesh announced through District Administration to assist with BDT 20,000 to family of each victim in Munshiganj. (*The Daily Dhaka Tribune*, September 21, 2017)

GoB Response in Rohingya Refugee:

According to “Bangladesh: Humanitarian Response Plan - September 2017 / February 2018 - Rohingya Refugee Crisis, Office of the UN Resident Coordinator, Bangladesh” the Government has triggered wide response across Ministries and agencies, and on 14 September allocated 2,000 acres of Forestry land for the establishment of a new camp to the west of Kutupalong. The Ministry of Disaster Management and Relief is coordinating the establishment of the new camp. The Government plans to relocate people from other settlements in Cox’s Bazar, and in Bandarban, to the new site.

The District Authority has established a mechanism for receiving and allocating private cash donations and has made efforts to curb the outpouring of private donations that have caused congestion and generated risk along the Kutupalong Road. The District health complex continues to provide essential support for people requiring urgent medical attention, receiving referrals from the humanitarian primary health facilities, and extending vaccination campaigns to cover new arrivals, with the Civil Surgeon establishing a district control room. The Department of Public Health Engineering has deployed resources to provide water in the spontaneous settlements. Local communities have been at the frontline of the response, providing food and basic items for new arrivals.

The National Task Force (NTF), chaired by the Foreign Secretary with participation from 22 Ministries and Agencies is monitoring the implementation of the national strategy and remains in place to oversee influx response. At district level, a District Task Force (DTF) is monitoring and coordinating the implementation of the strategy on the ground, led by the office of the Deputy Commissioner. The Military has deployed to Cox’s Bazar. The members of the Task Force include Ministries like MoHA, MDMR, MoCHTA, MoC and different line agencies like NGO Bureau, BBS, ERD, LGD as well as security and intelligence agencies (“Bangladesh: Humanitarian Response Plan - September 2017 / February 2018 - Rohingya Refugee Crisis, Office of the UN Resident Coordinator, Bangladesh”).

Conclusion

23 people died in 2 localized incidents of fire and boat/trawler capsized in September. Another natural incident lightning took lives of 20 people. Amongst these incidents, only 1 incident of fire in Munshiganj was announced to be responded by Government of Bangladesh. Other incidents were not responded by concerned authorities although causing huge casualties.
