




## Overview of Hazard Incidences in July 2024

A total of 9 distinct hazard incidents occurred in Bangladesh during July 2024. These incidents included COVID-19, dengue, fire incidents, waterlogging, heat waves, lightning, landslides, boat capsize, and floods. In June and July 2024, severe monsoon rains caused devastating floods across 15 districts, significantly impacting the lives of millions. The floods affected a total of 3.74 million people, with 25 reported deaths, including at least seven Rohingya refugees. Approximately 30,000 individuals were displaced to emergency shelters as floodwaters damaged homes, infrastructure, and agricultural lands. Besides, based on the DGHS daily situation report, there was an increase in confirmed dengue cases compared to the previous month. There were 2,033 confirmed cases and 11 reported deaths in total throughout July. In July 2024, a series of **boats capsized** across various regions in Bangladesh leading to a total of 10 deaths, 10 missing persons, and one injury. On the other hand, several lightning occurred and the impact was significant due to the sudden loss of six lives, affecting multiple families and communities across different regions on the same day Additionally, according to DGHS 306 patients were newly identified with COVID-19. During this period, there have been one reported death and 471 people have made a full recovery. This indicates that there has been a decrease in the number of confirmed cases and the number of deaths compared to the previous month. This month, two people were killed as a result of the landslides, and injured three individuals. Two extensive waterlogging in Baghaichhari Upazila of Rangamati and Dhaka led to six unions losing communication with their upazila headquarters, the washing away of a student and significant damage to fish ponds and crops, rise in mosquito infestations, a gas crisis, and foul-smelling tap water. From 1-19 July and 29-31 July, a total of 171 fire incidences were recorded across various divisions in Bangladesh, with no impacts reported in any region A heatwave from 16 July to 19 July was blown across Bangladesh. This heatwave, categorized as mild, impacted a wide range of several districts of Bangladesh.



## **Description of Hazard Incidences in July 2024**

#### Covid-19

In July, 306 patients were newly identified with Covid-19. During this period, there have been one reported death and 471 people have made a full recovery. This indicates that there has been a decrease in the number of confirmed cases as well as the number of deaths when compared to the previous month. Since the initial identification of COVID-19, the total number of confirmed cases has reached 20,51326 as of



the end of July. By the end of July, the total number of deaths in Bangladesh was 29,499, and the total number of cases that were recovered was 20,18983 (<u>DGHS</u>). Kindly refer to (<u>Annex 1</u>) to obtain a more comprehensive analysis.

#### **Dengue**

Based on the <u>DGHS</u> daily situation report, there was an increase in confirmed dengue cases compared to the previous month. In July, all **33** districts of Bangladesh were affected by dengue, and Dhaka as usual recorded the highest number of confirmed cases **(894)** and deaths **(6)**. There were **2,033** confirmed cases and 11 reported deaths in total throughout July. For in-depth analysis, please refer to (Annex 2).

### Flood

The recent floods in Bangladesh, triggered by torrential rains and swollen rivers, have resulted in significant humanitarian impacts across the country. The worst-affected districts are Sylhet, Sunamganj, Netrokona, Moulvibazar, Habiganj, Rangpur, Jamalpur, Gaibandha, Feni, Rangamati, Bogra, Kurigram, Sirajganj, Lalmonirhat, Tangail and Cox's Bazar The death toll stands at ten, with approximately 5.13 million people affected, including 1.5 million children and over 80,000 persons with disabilities. The floods have caused extensive damage to agriculture, livestock, and fisheries, severely disrupting the livelihoods of affected communities. Large areas of agricultural land, particularly in low-lying and riverine regions, have been submerged, damaging standing crops (Relief web).

## Lightning

On July 1st, in Kolara Union, Sadar Upazila of Narail District two men aged (55 and 50) died while grazing in the field <u>Prothom alo</u>. Similarly, on July 11th, two separate incidents in Rajshahi and Khulna Divisions resulted in additional fatalities. In Nejampur Union, Sadar Upazila of Capainawabganj, a 30-year-old and a 60-year-old man lost their lives while working in the fields (<u>Prothom alo</u>). On the same day, another fatality occurred in Chondibpur Union, Sadar Upazila of Narail, where a 62-year-old farmer died while grazing cattle (<u>Prothom alo</u>).

### **Boat Capsizes**

In July 2024, a series of tragic boat accidents across Bangladesh resulted in numerous fatalities and missing, highlighting the severe impact of flooding on transportation. In July 1st in Bandarban, two individuals went missing (<a href="Prothomalo">Prothomalo</a>). On July 2nd, three people went missing in a boat capsize in Dowarabajar, Sunamganj District (<a href="Prothomalo">Prothomalo</a>). This was followed by another missing person in Netrokona on July 4th. On July 5th in Narsingdi a boat accident resulted in one death and one person going missing. Two fatalities and one

injury were reported on July 7th in Shahjadpur, Sirajganj (<u>Prothom alo</u>) (<u>Prothom alo</u>). In July 9th, three more individuals were missing due to a boat capsize in Lalmonirhat (<u>tbs news</u>). On July 14th, two people were killed in another boat accident in Sunamganj (<u>Somoy news</u>) (<u>tbsnews</u>). In the other incident on July 267<sup>th</sup> three deaths in Teknaf. and one death in Patuakhali due to boat accidents (<u>Prothom alo</u>). For in-depth analysis, please refer to (<u>Annex 3</u>)

#### Landslide

On July 3, 2024, landslides caused significant damage in two districts of Bangladesh. In Chandraghona Upazila in Rangamati, **two** people were killed as a result of the landslides (<u>The Daily Star</u>). Concurrently in Chattogram, landslides injured three individuals. These incidents illustrate a troubling pattern of landslide-related fatalities and injuries, emphasizing the devastating impact of heavy rains and unstable terrain in affected areas (<u>The Daily Star</u>).

### Water logging

In 3rd July, an extensive waterlogging in Baghaichhari Upazila of Rangamati led to six unions losing communication with their upazila headquarters, the washing away of a student named Krittiva Chakma, and significant damage to fish ponds and crops (<a href="Dhaka Tribune">Dhaka Tribune</a>). On the other hand, on July 4th, particularly in areas of Mirpur, Mohammadpur, Farmgate, Tejgaon, Dholai Par, Bangshal, Gulshan, and Badda, waterlogging contributed to a rise in mosquito infestations, a gas crisis, and foul-smelling tap water (<a href="Dhaka Tribune">Dhaka Tribune</a>).

#### Heatwave

A heatwave from 16 July to 19 July was blown across Bangladesh. This heatwave, categorized as mild, impacted a wide range of areas including Rangpur, Gaibandha, Nilphamari, Kurigram, Lalmonirhat, Dinajpur, Thakurgaon, Panchagarh, as well as parts of Sylhet, Sunamganj, Moulvibazar, Habiganj, Feni, Tangail, Chuadanga, Rajshahi, Pabna, Bogura, and Netrokona (NDRCC). #### Fire

According to the Disaster Situation Report of the Ministry of Disaster Management and Relief (MoDMR), 171 fire incidents took place across the country in July (1-19 and 29-31) 2024. Dhaka division reported the highest number of fire incidents (58), followed by Rajshahi division (37), Khulna division (24), Chattogram division (17), Rangpur division (15), Mymensingh division (8), Barisal Division (7), Sylhet division (5). ## GoB Response in July 2024

### **Response to Flood**

The government's response includes TK 9,500,000 in cash relief, 3,700 tons of rice, and 13,500 food packs distributed across severely affected areas to urgently assist affected populations amidst this ongoing crisis (Relief web).

### **Response to Waterlogging**

The upazila administration of Bagachori has set up **55** shelters and is providing food to those affected by people Dhaka Tribune.

## Conclusion

Bangladesh experienced a variety of hazardous event occurrences in July 2024; the study emphasizes the need for a disaster management plan to lessen the effects of these events. This emphasizes the necessity of catastrophe risk mitigation through an integrated and proactive approach.
